Name(s) **Project Number Omer Cohen** 34495 **Project Title** Iron Fertilization in Relation to Oceanic pH **Abstract Objectives/Goals** Ocean acidification and effects of climate change are important areas of research o global impact. Ocean acidification occurs primarily because the ocean is a sink for carbon dioxide. ecosystems of pH sensitive organisms such as coral reefs are lethally effected. The purpose of this experiment was to investigate whether lowering the pH can stimulate cyan bacteria growth by increasing the bioavailability of iron. Increased cyanobacteria density leads to decreased carbon dioxide levels. Methods/Materials In the first experiment, Synechococcus sp. growth was examined following incubation in Gulf of Maine seawater at 22°C under a 13/11 light-dark cycle. The dependent variable, cycl density, was measured using a hemocytometer. The independent variables were iron concentration and initial pH. In the second experiment, the dependent variable was final pH. One trial, four samples for each variable were tested in duplicate. Results Synechococcus sp. density was generally found to be significantly increased at higher pH levels at concentrations of 6 and 12uM iron chloride. Growth did not significantly change in the absence of iron shloride. chloride. Conclusions/Discussion The results from these experiments do not support the hypothesis that with decreasing pH Synechococcus sp. would grow faster due to increased bioavailability on it on. However they raised interesting questions related to the reproductive ability of Synechococcus sp. at different pH levels. This also raised the question as to whether this species would survive conditions of lower pH levels in the ocean associated with ocean acidification.
